RACE LITERACY IMMERSION

This interactive course is customized for churches and ministries. Taught by Steve Park, Founder and Executive Director of Little Lights, and supported by a multiethnic group of trained facilitators, sessions include one facilitator for 4 to 6 participants.

- → Rooted in scripture, provides a theological underpinning to discuss race
- Dives into the history of racial ideology that has been used to oppress and divide people
- Grounded in 25 years of experience working a public housing community in Washington DC
- Challenges assumptions about race and racism
- Shifts paradigms to engage in the deep and difficult work of embodying biblical justice and righteousness
- Encourages participants to become peacemakers and reconcilers in a divided church and broken world
